## Highlighting the Core of Safety Eight in Numbers:

The Safety Eight focuses on key areas that are critical to ensuring a safe working environment for everyone.



- NEVER USE YOUR PHONE WHILE DRIVING
- ALWAYS WEAR YOUR PPE CORRECTLY
- USE SAFE WALKING ROUTES
- KNOW THE AIRPORT SPEED LIMIT
- ALWAYS DO A VEHICLE INSPECTION
- ALWAYS WEAR YOUR SEAT BELT
- ALWAYS BE AWARE OF THE EXPOSURE TO DANGEROUS GOODS
- ALWAYS WATCH OUT FOR THE BLIND SPOTS

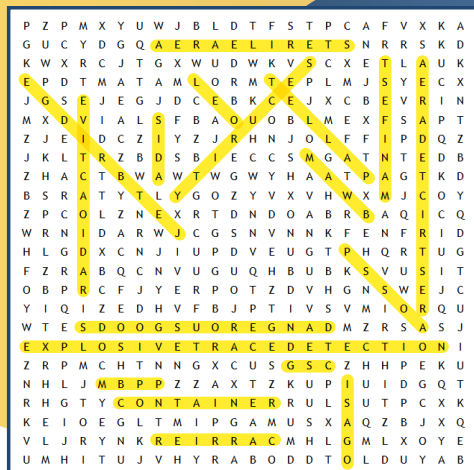
